Give your new friend a quiet place of his own in your home for the first few days, so (s)he has time to feel secure. Then slowly introduce children and other pets.
- 2. Put your new pet's needs ahead of your own. If you try to exert too much control at this point, the animal is likely to be more frightened and more standoffish. For a smooth transition, allow the animal to come to you on their terms, to communicate what (s)he needs from you.

In closing, Sandy gave a very contented Petie a healing treatment. "Don't worry so much, Mom," she relayed. "I'm going to be fine."
